

In 1982, DSSP became a member of the Association of Secretaries in Asia, now called Association of Secretaries and Administrative Professionals in Asia-Pacific (ASA). Today, DSSP members are a recognised force in the workplace and enjoy preferential treatment in the job market.



<u>Karachi</u>

Karachi, on the Arabian Sea near the Indus River delta, is the largest city and former capital of Pakistan. It is Pakistan's chief seaport and industrial centre, a transportation, commercial and financial hub. It has large automobile assembly plants, oil refineries, a steel mill, shipbreaking, railroad yards, jute and textile factories, printing and publishing plants, media and entertainment industries, food processing plants and chemical and engineering works. Karachi has several universities and educational institutions, the national museum with fine archaeological collections and the tomb of Quaid-e-Azam Muhammad Ali Jinnah, founder of Pakistan.

Frere Hall is one of the well preserved buildings in Karachi from the days of the British Raj. It was built in honour of Sir Henry Bartle Edward Frere (1815-1884), who was known for promoting economic development in Karachi.

TOUR 1: LAHORE TOUR - 2 NIGHTS / 3 DAYS

Day 01 Lahore

Visit the **Badshahi Mosque** or "Emperor's Mosque" built in 1673 by the Mughal Emperor Aurangzeb. Continue on to the **Lahore Fort** situated in the north-west corner of the Walled City of Lahore.

In the afternoon see the **Wazir Khan Mosque** also in the old city. Proceed to the **Golden Mosque** or Sunehri Masjid a relative latecomer to Lahore's traditional cityscape.

Overnight stay at Lahore

Day 02 Lahore

After breakfast visit **Lahore Museum**, an archaeological museum opened in 1894, containing the arts and crafts of the province of Punjab. Outside the Museum see '**Kim's Gun'** immortalised in Rudyard Kipling's novel "Kim". Continue to the **Tombs of Mughal Emperor Jahangir** and his wife **Noor Jehan**.

Suggested lunch at Salt'n Pepper Village Restaurant

In the afternoon visit **Shalimar Gardens**, constructed by Shah Jahan in 1641-2. Later enjoy the flag lowering ceremony at the Pakistan-India **Wagha Border**.

In the evening visit of the old town Food Street and suggested dinner at Coco's Café.

Overnight stay at Lahore

Day 03 Lahore

Free day in Lahore

TOUR 2: ISLAMABAD TOUR – 1 NIGHT / 2 DAYS

Day 01 Islamabad

City tour of Islamabad. Visit the **Shah Faisal Mosque**, designed by renowned Turkish architect, Vedat Dalokay and named after King Faisal of Saudi Arabia. Proceed to **Lok Virsa**, also known as the National Institute of Folk & Traditional Heritage, located near Shakarparian hills.

Road trips from Karachi include:

See the **National Monument in Islamabad**, representing the four provinces and three territories of Pakistan. From the air the monument looks like a star and a crescent. These represent the star and crescent on Pakistan's flag.

Suggested dinner at Pir Sohawa. Pir Sohawa offers a bird's eye view of Rawal Lake and the twin cities of Rawalpindi and Islamabad.

Overnight stay at Islamabad

Day 02 Islamabad

After breakfast leave for **Taxila**; a 45 minutes' drive. Taxila represents one of the most important archaeological sites in Pakistan and was once the capital of the rich Gandharan Buddhist civilization. Continue visit of the **Site and the Museum.**

TOUR 3: LAHORE & ISLAMABAD - 2 NIGHTS / 3 DAYS

Day 01 Lahore

Begins with **Badshahi Mosque** or "Emperor's Mosque" built in 1673 by the Mughal Emperor Aurangzeb. Next stop is the **Lahore Fort.** Continue to **Wazir Khan Mosque** also in the old city. Last stop is the **Shalimar Gardens**, constructed by Shah Jahan in 1641-2.

Overnight stay at Lahore

Day 02 Lahore – Islamabad

After breakfast, leave for **Rohtas Fort** approx. 03 hrs. drive, one of the most imposing historical monuments which represents the Pathan period of architecture style in Pakistan.

Proceed to Islamabad approx. 03 hrs. drive. Suggested dinner at Pir Sohawa.

Overnight stay at Islamabad

Day 03 Islamabad

After breakfast leave for Taxila; a 45 minutes' drive. Visit the Site and the Museum.

Proceed for city tour of Islamabad. Begin with the **Shah Faisal Mosque**. Continue on to **Lok Virsa.** Last stop is the **National Monument.**

TOUR 4: ISLAMABAD AND MURREE HILLS - 2 NIGHTS / 3 DAYS

Day 01 Islamabad

On arrival, set out for Taxila; a 45 minutes' drive. Visit the Site and the Museum.

Proceed to Islamabad. First visit to Shah Faisal Mosque. Continue on to Lok Virsa. Next see the National Monument in Islamabad. Suggested dinner at Pir Sohawa.

Overnight stay at Islamabad

Day 02 Islamabad – Murree Hills

After breakfast leave for **Murree** approx. 02 hrs. drive. Continue visit of **Nathia Gali and Ayubia** Nathia Gali is a mountain resort town and a part of the hillstations known for its scenic beauty.

Overnight stay at Murree

Day 03 Islamabad – Murree Hills

After breakfast set out for **Patriata** and **Bhurban**. Patriata is a quiet retreat at the highest point of Murree Hills. There is a chair lift and cable car system for transportation to the highest point. Bhurban is 15 km is north-east of Murree.

Return to Islamabad approx. 02 hrs. drive.





TOUR 5: MOHENJO DARO TOUR FROM SUKKUR - 1 DAY

Day 01 Karachi – Sukkur

Pickup from Sukkur airport. On arrival set out for **Mohenjo Daro** (Mound of the Dead) approx. 02 $\frac{1}{2}$ hrs. drive.

Mohenjo Daro was built around 2600 BC and abandoned around 1900 BC. It was rediscovered in 1922. Lunch will be served at Mohenjo Daro.

After lunch visit of **Site & Museum**; which contain artefacts including engraved seals, terracotta toys, jewellery and other ornaments.

Later drop to the Mohenjo Daro airport. Take flight to Sukkur and then from Sukkur return to Karachi.

TOUR 6: HYDERABAD AND BHIT SHAH – DAY TRIP

Pickup from hotel in Karachi at 06.00 hrs.

Leave for **Hyderabad** approximately 02 ½ hrs. drive. Hyderabad is located in the Sindh province of Pakistan. The city was founded in 1768 by Mian Ghulam Shah Kalhoro upon the ruins of a Mauryan fishing village along the bank of the Indus known as Neroon Kot and was formerly the capital of Sindh. On arrival at approx. 0900 hrs. visit one of the famous "**Glass Bangles**" factories. Continue to the **Hyderabad Museum**.

Suggested Lunch at KFC, Hyderabad

After lunch proceed to **Hala**, approx. 01 hr. drive. Hala is one of the most historical, literary and religious towns of Sindh famous for its art, pottery, wood work and cloth printing.

Continue on to visit **Bhit Shah.** Situated at about 56 km from Hyderabad on the National Highway, Bhitshah is the resting place of Sindh's renowned saint and mystic poet Hazrat Shah Abdul Latif Bhitai (1689 - 1752). On arrival at Bhit Shah, witness the printing work of the **Ajrak. The unique fabric native to Sindh province**

At 17.30 hrs. return to Karachi. Arrival at Karachi at approx. 21.30-22.00 hrs.

(Subject to departure time from Bhit Shah and traffic).

TOUR 7: CHAUKHANDI, BHAMBORE, THATTA, MAKLI TOUR – DAY TRIP

Pickup from hotel in Karachi at 08.00 hrs. and leave for Chaukhandi, a 45 minutes' drive.

Chaukhandi tombs, are attributed to the Jokhio and Baloch tribes and were built between the 15th and 18th century. Afterwards proceed to **Bhambore**, which are the ruins of an ancient port city of Debal from the 7th century located at the base of river Indus. Continue to **Thatta**, once a large and prosperous city which declined after the Indus changed course in the early 8th century. See the beautiful Mosque built by Mughal Emperor Shah Jehan between 1644 and 1647.

Suggested packed picnic lunch box at Thatta

After lunch visit Makli, one of the largest necropolises in the world.

At 16.30 hrs. start back to Karachi. Arrival at Karachi at 20.00 hrs. (Approximately, subject to traffic)

Additional Information

Visa Requirements:

Visas to Pakistan are required by all nationals. Please check for details with your local Pakistan High Commission Office.

Currency / Credit Cards:

- US dollars remain the most widely accepted foreign currency. When you exchange money keep the official currency exchange receipts that you will be given this way you have a better chance of exchanging back any unspent currency. Avoid accepting any torn or dirty notes as these are more difficult to spend. You might not always be asked for your passport when you exchange money, but it is advisable to have a photocopy ready.
- Pakistan Rupee (PKR; Symbol Rs.). Notes are in denominations of Rs.5,000, 1,000, 500, 100, 20 and 10. Coins are in denominations of Rs.5, 2 and 1. It is easier to exchange notes in smaller denominations than the Rs.5,000/-
- MasterCard and Visa are generally used in Pakistan. Cash is far more useful high-end hotels, airline offices, upmarket shops and restaurants will accept credit cards. At some outlets, there may be a 2.5% upcharge on the use of the credit card.
- There are ATMs in all major cities.
- Banking Hours are: Mon.-Thu.: 09.00-17.30 hrs. Fri: 09.00-12.30 and 14.30 18.00 hrs. Sat: Few designated branches open from 10.00-13.00 hrs.

Climate and Time Zone:

- September is a hot month in Karachi with temperatures averaging 30Deg. C. As it's also the end of the monsoons, there is a slight possibility of rain. Lahore and Rawalpindi's temperature would be warmer.
- Pakistan is five hours ahead of Greenwich Mean Time (GMT)

Language and Dress:

- Urdu is the national language and English the official language. Both are widely spoken.
- Pakistani women run the whole gamut when it comes to fashion do's and don'ts. You will notice that western clothing on women is generally seen in fashionable areas of major cities. In most rural areas of the country, you should expect to dress conservatively. Women usually wear long shirts (around knee length) called *kameez* or shorter shirts called *kurtis*. The shorter the shirt, the less conservative it is. Along with the long shirt, women usually wear loose pants called *shalwar*. Most women, again outside of posh areas, don't leave home without a *dupatta*, or long scarf. The main purpose of the scarf is to cover your bosom and neckline.
- As the Karachi city tour (Sun. 14 Sep. 2014) includes visits to places of worship, you might wish to carry a head covering and socks if you are required to enter barefoot.

Health:

Unclean food and water can cause diarrhoea. Reduce your risk by sticking to safe food and water habits. Use bottled water that is sealed.

Transportation and Shopping:

- There will be a Car Hire Service at the Avari Towers Hotel. Taxis and auto rickshaws are an alternate means of travel. It is advisable to know the approximate fare as they do not run on meters and occasionally visitors to Karachi can be fleeced.
- The nearest market for clothes and souvenirs is Rio Centre, across the road about 5 minutes' walk from Avari Towers, and on the other side of Rio Centre is Zainab Market, approximately 7 minutes' walk from Avari Towers. Shopping here is far cheaper than the high-end malls, but bargaining is a must. Higher-end shopping is available at Atrium Mall, along the same road as the Avari Towers, about 6 minutes' walk from the Hotel. Other malls are Dolmen Mall, The Forum, Ocean Mall and Emerald Tower, all at a 10-15 mins. drive from the hotel.

Power Voltage:

Electricity is 220 – 240 Volts, 50 cycles. Standard fittings are for round two-pin plugs, but adaptors are easily available.
